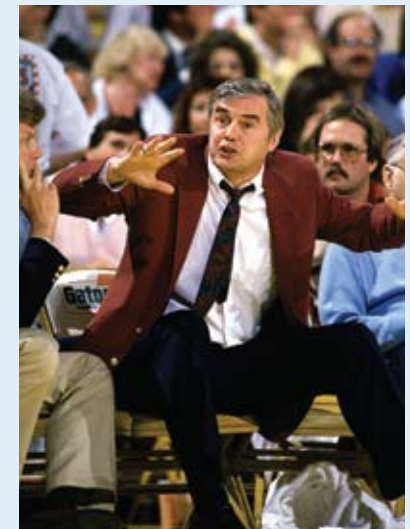

TONIGHT'S GUEST OF HONOR, DOUG MOE



Usually when you describe somebody you know, it is easy to sum them up with a simple phrase, like "he's really a (fill in the blank) guy."

And then there's Doug Moe.

A simple phrase to describe Doug does not exist. In the annals of professional basketball and Denver sports, there are few personalities that stand out like Doug. He is a true jewel of a character that not even the most imaginative novelist could make up. How lucky for all of us!

Those who would simply label Doug as just a jokester or funnyman who also happened to coach are overlooking one of the most competitive spirits to ever guide a professional sports team in Denver. Doug's will to win drove his teams to the NBA Playoffs 12 times as a Head Coach, including an unmatched Denver record of nine straight NBA Playoffs with the Nuggets. His fierce competitiveness is as strong today as ever (just sit next to him sometime during a Nuggets game!), but more importantly, so is his loyalty to friends, zest for laughter and joy for life. That is why there is a room full of hundreds of people here tonight to honor the biggest stiff of them all.

So while he would much rather tell us all to "kiss off," than listen to us pay tribute to him, thanks Doug, for being the first honoree of the JoAnn B. Ficke Cancer Foundation.

BASKETBALL BIO: From 1980-90, Moe compiled a 432-357 (.548) record with Denver. He guided the Nuggets to two Midwest Division titles ('84-85 and '87-88). Moe began his career with the Nuggets in the ABA as an assistant coach to his collegiate and pro teammate, Larry Brown, from 1974-76. Moe has also served as a head coach for the San Antonio Spurs (1976-80) and Philadelphia 76ers (1992-93). His overall NBA head coaching ledger stands at 628-529 (.543) and his wins are the 19th-most in NBA history. The Brooklyn, N.Y. native was a two-time All-American at the University of North Carolina.

Moe is married to the woman he fondly calls, "Big Jane." The couple has two sons, David and Doug Jr., and six grand children.
